- NAHSL members are looking for free or low-cost CE
- most NAHSL members only place a little importance on earning MLA CE credit when choosing NAHSL CE courses

CE Courses 2021

Due to COVID, all CE was offered online this year. In response to the survey results, and with the approval of the Executive Committee, the Education Committee decided to offer free CE for NAHSL members this year. We sponsored three online courses:

- Keep Attendees Engaged: Making Online Meetings and Training Highly Interactive J.
 Casella took place on June 16. 25 NAHSL members, 1 nonmember registered. Excellent interactive course which received very positive feedback.
- Design Basics: How to Create Better Visuals D. Haugh took place on September 23. Really good enrollment numbers! 40 registered, 26 attended. Excellent presentation with very good evaluation feedback. Unfortunate Zoom technical difficulties prevented some people from getting in and also disrupted the recording. Refunds were offered to nonmembers who paid for the class but were unable to attend due to the technical issues.

Planning for 2022 CE Courses
